South Florida Council Proudly Presents the Silver Beaver to...

The annual South Florida Council Recognition Dinner was held this year on March 16 at the Merchandise Mart Radisson in Miami. The main focus of the evening each year is the presentation of the Silver Beaver Award. The Silver Beaver Award is bestowed on behalf of the National Court of Honor, but its recipients are nominated on the Council level. It was created to recognize those Scouters who have given noteworthy service to youth within the Council. The award is a cast silver beaver on a blue and white ribbon that is worn around the neck. The beaver symbolizes hard work, dedication, and an undying devotion to the principles of Scouting. This year the South Florida Council awarded the Silver Beaver to fourteen exemplary Scouters, half of which are members of the O-Shot-Caw Lodge. Daniel Rubin is an Eagle Scout Brotherhood member of O-Shot-Caw Lodge, former Drum Team Chairman as well as Publications Chairman for the 1998 Section Conference. Founder's Award Recipients

Introduced at the 1981 National Order of the Arrow Conference, the Founder's Award was created to honor and recognize those Arrowmen who have given outstanding service to the lodge. The Award is reserved for an Arrowmen who demonstrates to fellow Arrowmen that he or she memorializes in his or her everyday life the "Spirit of Achievement" as described by founder E. Urner Goodman and cofounder Carroll A. Edson. The Award is a handsome bronze medallion bearing the likenesses of E. Urner Goodman and cofounder Carroll A. Edson, with wooden base and brass plate suitable for engraving. Also presented is a special Founder's Award arrow ribbon, with a gold colored arrow suspended from a red ribbon. This year the O-Shot-Caw Lodge presented the Founder's Award

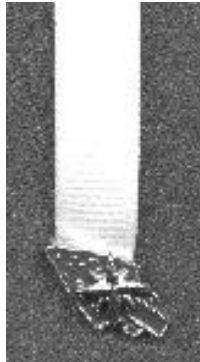

Arrowman Service Award

The Order of the Arrow's vision for the future emphasizes a strategy of increased service to the Boy Scouts of America by Arrowmen. To reward those Arrowmen who go beyond their immediate responsibilities to help and guide others to new heights, the Order of the Arrow created the Arrowman Service Award. The award focuses on three areas of service: personal, chapter/lodge activities, and general service to the community. The design selected is the arrowhead with the compass rose. The compass rose symbolizes direction; the path ahead for one's travel. Since our strategic plan also offers direction for the Order's future, the compass rose is appropriately superimposed over the arrowhead. The arrowhead will be red, with the compass rose in gold. 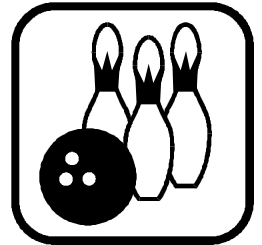

A message from Hal Hollis...

~Camp Seminole is sacred ground. This is your land~

Seminole, "humble though it may be, offers sanctuary: a place consecrated by the truths it helps us recollect, a refuge to which we can retreat in time of need, a place we go looking to find ourselves."

Protected areas are a civilized society's strongest signs of farsightedness, prosperity, and greatness of spirit. It is also a sacred and spiritual site for our neighbors the Seminole Indians.

When South Florida Council was given the use of the property there were five chickees on it, built by the Seminoles. . . no shrubs, no grass, and no trees. That's right, no trees. Can you picture that?

As Arrowmen we should all be proud. O-Shot-Caw was the inspiration of the tree planting at Seminole. One year the cost of attending an Ordeal weekend was partly money, but also we had to bring a live tree, plant it somewhere, anywhere, water and take care of it the whole weekend. And we suggested and hoped the planter would return occasionally during the following month to water and care for it.

Some of the first trees we planted as a group, perhaps much to our chagrin and mortification, were the Australian pine. Our plan was to plant a row of them on the north and west property lines. When grown that would help keep out the mighty cold wintry northwest winds. This was decided at a horrific experience during a mighty cold February Ordeal. But they sort of got out of hand, didn't they.

Another time the Lodge received from the state some 5,000 slash pines. We spend the weekend planting anywhere and everywhere. Many of them took root.

Are we to suppose the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge is not also sacred and spiritual? Visualize Camp Seminole with boys tenting around oil derricks. Some say it is our patriotic duty to drill for oil: for jobs, for defense, for the American way of life. No one mentions for profit.

We need thick forests to ensure that we will have the oxygen we need to breathe. We need a lively, bustling natural world so we can stay healthy. We are part of nature and need to feel whole with nature. We cannot take such things for granted. They are too precious.

Think of the thousands, perhaps millions, of boys, now grown into manhood, who had their first taste of the "out doors" at Camp Seminole. Perhaps you were one of them. Consider all the burned (but still tasteful and partially eaten) meals prepared by boys of all ages.

We have preserved Camp Seminole. Why?

We believe we are doing this not only for boys who will be coming along, but also to preserve some of natural Florida in the middle of our so-called civilization. Nature is widely and constantly encountered, if only we care to see it.

We must always remember that Camp Seminole is sacred ground.

“How do I become a 2002-2003 O-Shot-Caw Lodge Officer?”

Lodge Officers as defined by the *Guide for Officers and Advisers* are the Lodge Chief, Lodge Vice-Chief, Lodge Secretary, and Lodge Treasurer. Some Lodges find it desirable to elect more than one vice chief (O-Shot-Caw exercises this right with the Second Vice Chief). Arrowman desiring to serve as a Lodge Officer or Committee Chairman must meet the following eligibility requirements: 1) Be currently registered in Scouting, in the Council that charters the Lodge. 2) Be a member in good standing in the Lodge. 3) Be younger than 21 for the entire term of office. Officers serve for a one-year term. Officers may be reelected. All members of the lodge younger than 21 are eligible to vote. This voting takes place the Sunday morning of the Summer Ordeal at Camp Lone Oak.

So, how do you run? It's quite simple. All Arrowman seeking Office have the opportunity to give a campaign speech Saturday afternoon to both the Lodge and Ordeal Candidates, and again on Sunday morning. In order to give a speech on both occasions, you need to have a signed letter of approval from your Chapter Adviser stating you are eligible to run for the desired office(s) and then must be nominated by an Arrowman at the Ordeal itself. The order of speaking rights will be honored in order of nomination. The elections will take place in the following Order: Lodge Chief – First Vice Chief – Second Vice Chief – Secretary – Treasurer. You are allowed to run for another office in the event that you lose your prior election. For example, if you run for First Vice Chief and lose, you are still eligible to run for Second Vice Chief and the other two offices. Many Arrowmen use this to their advantage.

“Can I campaign?” The answer is technically yes. However, the Summer Ordeal is a weekend of Cheerful Service. Every Arrowman will be working to prepare the camp for the summer. Should you wish to do any campaigning, your best bet is to just attend all OA functions, properly wear your class A uniform with OA sash and Arrowmen will notice. On a crucial note, being a Lodge Officer is a very TIME committed job. Your duties are great and very rewarding. An elected Lodge Officer is expected to attend all LEC meetings, OA Functions, and Council events to set the example of unselfish aim and purpose. If you want to be a Lodge Officer, you have to run because YOU truly want to serve the Lodge. Never run under pressure. The best advice you can receive will come from the current Lodge Officers. Their e-mails are listed here and can also be found on the Lodge website.

In the words of Colin Powel, “Leadership is the art of accomplishing more than the science of management says is possible.” Be a Lodge Officer because you want to make a difference.

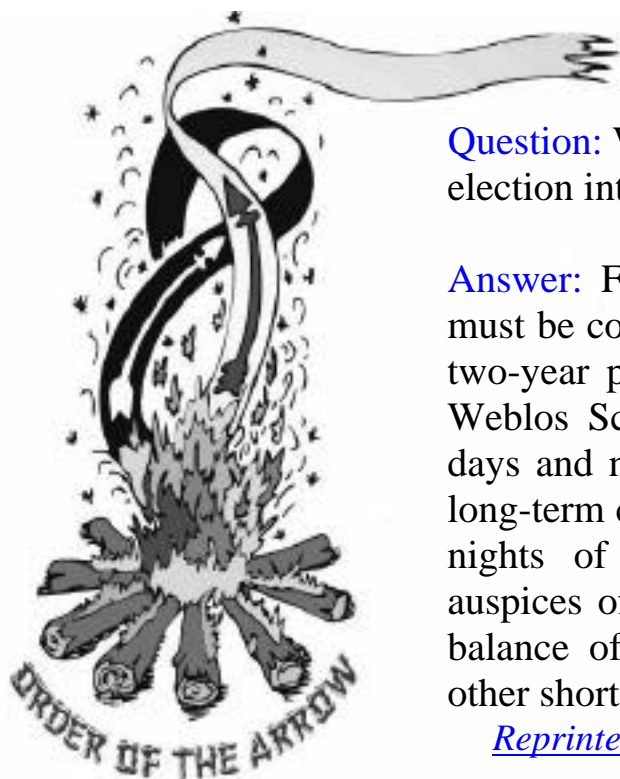

Burning Issues

Question: What are the approved camping requirements for election into the Order of the Arrow?

Answer: Fifteen days and nights of Boy Scout camping must be completed after joining a troop or team within the two-year period prior to the election. That eliminates all Webelos Scout, Cub Scout, and family camping. The 15 days and nights must include one, but no more than one, long-term camp consisting of six consecutive days and five nights of resident camping, approved and under the auspices of standards of the Boy Scouts of America. The balance of the camping must be overnight, weekend or other short-term camps.
