SPECIAL PROJECTS PROVIDED IN 2020 O-SHOT-CAW LODGE'S DIRT PATROL



O-Shot-Caw Lodge's Dirt Patrol is a group of lodge members that are concerned with keeping Camp Elmore, one of our Council Camps, environmentally sustainable and in good condition. They often work with organizations such as Natural Resources Conservation Service, Fairchild Tropical Gardens, Broward NatureScape, South Florida Audubon, amongst many others who has assisted by donating to their efforts.



Throughout the entire year, the Dirt Patrol continued to work on native reforesting and exotic eradication in Camp Elmore. They also assisted



with camp maintenance to prepare the camps for council programs and camp renovations. Camp maintenance include string trimming campsites and trails, clearing fishing channels, and planting slash pines in tall weed areas. They also deployed thousands of bugs called "thrips" to help manage the growth of Brazilian Pepper in the long term while keeping it safe for a Florida environment. In doing so, Camp Elmore is now considered a biological control monitoring station over the spread of these in-

sects for the U.S. Department of Agriculture for Invasive Plant Species Research. Over the past year, the dirt patrol states to have planted a total of 1,322 native trees, with an ultimate goal of 9,000 trees for years to come.

It's also worth noting that in February, the Dirt Patrol was selected to receive a statewide award by the Florida Urban Forestry Council in the Outstanding Project category.

Our lodge is very proud to have so many dedicated arrowmen participating in this effort.

SPECIAL PROJECTS PROVIDED IN 2020 CEREMONIES RING WORKDAYS



Our lodge has been planning a major remodel of the Ron Bell OA Ceremonies Ring at Camp Elmore. Renovations include constructing an altar, sash poles, entry columns, and a triangular fire pit. Blueprints and models for the new ceremonies ring are inspired by the Summit Circle at the Summit Bechtel Reserve. After over a year of planning, O-Shot-Caw arrowmen broke ground and held a series of seven work days throughout December, including a service campout on Dec. 26 to 28.



Arrowmen have had quite the job during these workdays and were crucial to every step of the project. They hauled materials and surveyed the site. They also dug holes for all structures being constructed and installed to provide a natural molding and a foundation. Youth then used a profession pump and mixer to pour cement into each of the

holes. They used steel rebar supports and frames, wooden molds,



cinder blocks and mortar to construct these structures. They also set up a gas line using PVC piping to direct propane into the 15 candles used in a typical OA Ceremony. Arrowmen also created a menial road that goes into the ceremonies ring, where excess cement was poured on to.

After many days of hard and meticulous work, our arrowmen turned one of the most ambitious renovations ever planned for Elmore into reality with no materials spared. While there is plenty to be done, O-Shot-Caw ended strong with all the effort demonstrated in this project.

SPECIAL PROJECTS PROVIDED IN 2020 O-SHOT-CAW BUILDS ZOO MIAMI CAMPSITE





The former Hnu-Ra-Con Chapter, now part of the Pah-Ha-Yo-Kee Chapter, began working on a primitive campsite at ZooMiami on Dec 23, 2017. As far as our research can tell, this is the only primitive campsite constructed within a zoo. The project has been a cooperative effort between members of the Lodge, members of the community and ZooMiami staff. Several other organizations have donated trees and shrubs to the site as we near completion.

The campsite sits on a small piece of property at ZooMiami in the middle of some of the last endangered Miami-Dade Pine Rocklands. The site had been declared as contaminated since it was used as a dumping ground. You can hear the lions, tigers, monkeys, and other animals in the zoo from the campsite.

There are well over 500 service hours invested in this project since it's inception. The project would have been completed in Spring 2020 if not for the COVID-19 pandemic.

There were also three Eagle Projects (not included in our hour count) that were a part of this endeavor. The 1st was to build a campfire pit and benches. The 2nd was to build picnic tables for meals. There is a designated area for cooking and eating in order to maintain the primitive nature of the Campsite. The 3rd project was building a dozen more benches.

The side of the building was cleaned and painted so that occupants can project movies and hold nature classes on the site. In addition to regular campsites, we also have constructed two pinwheel-style sites that will accommodate up to 16 hammocks.

WINTER ORDEAL - JANUARY 10-12, 2020 CAMP EVERGLADES



The very first lodge event of the year was the Winter Ordeal held at Camp Everglades, one of the few BSA camps within the perimeters of a national park, the weekend of Jan. 10-12.

A lot of people came out to serve, including the 62 new ordeal members as well as the 27 brothers who came back to seal their ties in brotherhood.

Many service projects were executed at this ordeal, including the trimming of overhanging branches over the main road, dig out ash from fire rings, construct and paint 20 benches for the activities field, and paint outhouses, showers, and picnic tables. Adults constructed and installed metal roofs over the pavilions in campsites Crow, Dove, and Egret and built a compost toilet in campsite Quail.

As traditionally done in O-Shot-Caw, the former To-Hopki-Lagi chapter cooked, prepped and served meals to all brothers who attended the weekend. They also prepared food for the ordeal candidates.

On Sunday morning, arrowmen got the chance to participate in our committee fair, where they can learn more about the lodge and how they can get involved. They also participated and observed an L.E.C. business meeting. Clean-up assignments were arranged afterwards.

Lincoln Marti is a Council event the lodge assists every year, helping with various programs and administrative needs throughout the weekend.

On Jan. 17, the O-Shot-Caw lodge set up an Indian Village, which allowed the lodge to promote the ideals and influences of the Order of the Arrow through the variety of stations and programs.

Scouts could interact with arrowmen through stations such as camp promotions, the games tent, and AIA. Camp promotions

allowed scouts to learn about different the three BSA Camps in South Florida Council; Camp Elmore, Camp Everglades, and Camp Sawyer. The games tent allowed scouts to play an Indian dice game as well as arm wrestling, which became a huge hit for the area.

The village also included a dance arbor where scouts and parents can sit and listen to the O-Shot-Caw Lodge Drum Team sing as well as see dancers from the O-Shot-Caw Dance Team perform a variety of dances ranging from Northern Traditional to Prairie Chicken. After the mini-powwows, scouts could come up to the AIA tent and learn more about the dances and the dancer's regalia.



After visiting each station, the participating scouts received a 'Future Arrowman' t-shirt to take home as a souvenir.

The Indian Village turned out to be a success. Scouts had fun learning and experiencing American Indian culture, and existing brothers were interested in getting more involved with the lodge.

We also have members helping with other activities like archery, judging gateways and campsites, and worked as administrative staff.
